In addition, our regular schedule includes the Nephi Senior lunch (first Wednesday), Delta Sands Apartments and Delta Care Center (second Monday), Scipio Senior Center lunch (second Wednesday), Delta Senior lunch (third Wednesday, and the Fillmore Senior Center (fourth Monday). We are so blessed to have such appreciative audiences in each of these places!

We are also blessed to have such dedicated members. Mick and Pat Butterfield, Dale Pratt, and Norm Mincer are the existing original members when the Pahvant Chapter was formed around 1993.



Since that time, we have had many members come and go. Our current members are always there if possible. Work schedules, travel, care of children, and other things can keep some away at times. Ed Alder drives 100 miles or more one way, 50 miles of that on a dirt road, and he rarely misses! Ross Murdock will also drive 100 miles from Enoch! One night in Fillmore, I introduced the players and a man in the audience asked how many miles round trip in total this group had driven that night to be there. I didn't know offhand, but calculated the miles when I got home. The total was 655 miles!

Playing right here in Delta we travel about 300 miles roundtrip, and if Ed Alder doesn't come, it is around 150 miles. The man then asked if we get reimbursed for our travel and Mick Butterfield responded appropriately. He said we are entitled to reimbursement, but he didn't want it because playing for groups like that, was his willing contribution, and it was also his therapy.

Sound equipment can be a real problem. Hauling all the amplifiers, mics, cables, and speakers is work and equipment can get damaged. Also, there is usually only one or two people familiar with it enough to set it up properly.

Early in 2022, the Six County Association of Governments purchased a basic sound system for each of the Senior Centers where we play. The system has a great amplifier and fabulous line speakers! We are thankful to the Six County AOG! The system is limited on input, so we do take a small four channel mixer and an inexpensive cordless microphone set with four mics.

We are looking forward to an active 2023 and pray the same for all the other chapters.

We had nearly 25 performances during the year.
